PROSPECTUS.

At the present day, when an extensive knowledge of the Regulations and Acts of the Supreme Government is absolutely necessary, ere one can hope to obtain even the lowest grade of judicial appointment; and having personally experienced how difficult and harrassing an undertaking is the study of the law, without the aid of an efficient guide, I have thought it expedient to establish a law class for students of all denominations, who will be taught the simplest method of perfecting themselves in the law of the land.

While offering to train youth to the law, I have had an eye to the pleasing prospect in the future, when—judging by the daily increasing demands of the state—the East India Directors must see the necessity of creating a large number of respectable appointments throughout the Mofussil, for the uncovenanted. This time may not be far off, and it is plain that they only will be eligible for these appointments, whose knowledge of the laws and languages of the country, guarantees their fitness for them.

Parents and guardians, who foreseeing the benefits of a law education, may send their children and wards to me for instruction, may depend upon my using my best exertions in their behalf. Young men who may place themselves under my tuition, will receive every assistance in smoothing the difficulties of their studies, by hints and explanations, which to the uninitiated must ever be essential, and by having pointed out to them such plans of application, as will greatly facilitate those studies.

While alive to the advantages arising from a proficiency in the law, I have not forgotten that *cheap* tuition is necessary to secure those advantages to the general body. I have therefore fixed on the very moderate sum of five rupees a month for each student.

I shall be happy to engage with public schools and colleges, where it may be thought advisable to form a class of law students.
