Sir,

In reply to your confidential No. 8659A dated the 23rd September 1930, I have the honour to say that from the beginning of August it was found necessary to make arrangements for a careful scrutiny of the students entering the College compound. These arrangements involved for several weeks a heavy burden of extra work which was cheerfully undertaken by the Teaching Staff. I did not attempt to introduce any systematic rotation in regard to this duty but left it to the staff to supply volunteers daily. There was an unfailing supply of volunteers. As always happens in such cases, it was noticeable that, while most of the staff did their fair share and some a good deal more, a few were conspicuously absent. I am glad to be able to report that Babu Malini Kanta Brahma was one of those who made an honest and continuous effort to help.

Sir,

I have the honour to address Government on the subject of the crossing of the first efficiency bar in the Bengal Educational Service by Babu Nalini Kanta Brahma, M.A., Professor of Philosophy, Presidency College.

2. Professor Brahma is at present drawing pay at the rate of Rs.460/- per month in the Bengal Educational Service and will be entitled to draw pay at the rate of Rs.500/- per month from 8th July 1930 if he is allowed to cross the bar at the stage of Rs.460/- in the time scale of pay for that service. A copy of the Accountant General's letter No.G.A.-III-461, dated 28th June 1930 certifying the date of increment of Professor Brahma's pay to Rs.500/- is enclosed herewith for the information of Government.

3. The work of Professor Brahma has been very satisfactory. He is a conscientious teacher and a keen student. He obtained the Premchand and Roychand Scholarship of the University of Calcutta in 1923. A copy of the Principal's letter No. 2V, dated 6th June 1930 together with a copy of its enclosure is enclosed herewith. In the opinion of the Principal,

Professor Brahma has used his talents to the advantage of the College and he should be allowed to cross the bar.

4. I accept the views of Mr. Barrow and request that Government may be pleased to issue orders permitting Babu Nalini Kanto Brahma, Professor, Presidency College, to cross the first efficiency bar at the stage of Rs.460/- in the time-scale of pay for the Bengal Educational Service and to draw pay at the rate of Rs.500/- per month with effect from 8th July 1930.

5. The confidential reports on Professor Brahma are submitted herewith. They may be returned with the orders of Government.
