My dear Bottomley,
Your confidential D. O. No. 106 C dated the 30th August 1935 regarding the Circular letter of the University on steps to combat terrorist activities in schools.

In reply I have to state that the discipline of Hindu and Hare Schools has always been maintained at a high level and so far as can be ascertained, there has been no terrorist activity in these schools. But the provision of direct moral and religious education is a ticklish business and, I believe, does not touch life as intimately as it is believed to. The better course of achieving the same object would be by personal example and contact of the teachers and the holding up of high ideals through the lites of eminent men. This method rather than that of direct instruction is tried as far as practicable.

Well-known journals are subscribed for the Common-Rooms and subjects of general interest are discussed in debates. The school magazine also gives a scope for selfexpression to the boys.

Games and sports under proper supervision are held and always encourage within the limitations of a day school in a bie city and the response of the boys are satisfactory.
