SIR,

I AM directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letters noted on the margin, and in reply, with reference to the question raised regarding the pay of Mr. Galwey, of the Presidency College, I am to point out that, in his letter of appointment No. 5169, dated 22nd November 1864, that gentleman was distinctly informed that his promotion from the salary of Rupees 600 to Rupees 700 per mensem would be conditional on his passing in one of the vernacular languages. This condition is not affected by the scheme of graduated salaries sanctioned by Government.

2. In regard to Messrs. Bellett, Martin, and Scott, I am to say that their first promotion in salary should date from their passing their vernacular examination. In the case of Officers appointed in England, promotion on passing will not be at once to the salary to which their service was respectively of their passing, entitle them, but will be made in the manner described in the 4th paragraph of Mr. Atkinson's letter No. 1205, dated 1st July 1865, as quoted and interpreted by you.

3. Mr. Scott will draw Rupees 350 per mensem until he passes in the vernacular.

4. The "original scheme" alluded to in endorsement from this Office No. 4803, dated 7th August last, is the one submitted by Mr. Atkinson with his letter No. 1205, dated 18th March 1865, which has been modified by the orders of the Government in India in the Financial Department, No. 1212, dated 13th July last.

5. A copy of the letter to the Government of India, No. 3401, dated 11th May 1865, relative to your salary under the new scheme, is forwarded for your information as requested.

I have the honor to acknowledge your Memoir of the 18th current and in reply to state that should the gravest objection to the transfer therein referred to, the reasons stated to you by the applicants in a former survey may quite decide the matter. They have lived several years past in the greatest comfort and at the least with no expenses as there are great many who do not live in the suburbs, but some are lodged by others and many reside by many living together, sharing the same house, the most careful inquiry? Please to be assured that we are not to be put a piece of work in the hands of the best others, and had so lived as we are now. Some of these have been tried to satisfy their minds that they had no convenience of living in the suburbs. To your greater satisfaction, I enclose their letter. You will find that one of them, having the

a grant savings would be devoted to pay his expenses in
 studying for the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Calcutta, or here should the
 Govt. sanction the proposal of the Community for a Latin Class
at the Museum. It is understood that nothing of his former
 interest in the seminary is now accordingly returned to the
 Institution in January last, when a Latin Class was
 established a week ago, he was immediately a return to

At the beginning of this session, fourth year the

to your College and to the circumstances; then proceeded
to excite the jealousy of part of the other students

since their classes. I see this morning leadfull evidence
of a sort of combination to prevent the Presidency College in this
country. The three only have moved at the purpose, the
rest have, I trust, abandoned it. The cry of the sufficiency
of the present staff is, I consider, utterly groundless,
except in respect of its ability to execute which I expect
to shortly be reviewed.

After the examination I would not wish to give
any other kind of encouragement should be given to
the students of the Presidency College, when, as
is well known, steps are being taken by Govt. to raise
the standard of the highest order of instruction.
The transfer of these two students would
be only an encouragement of combinations inconsistent
with the plan of the Govt. but would be a measure directly
opposite to the design of Govt. to extend a full
education to the people.
