Some time ago on speaking to the  
Lieutenant-Governor regarding my desire to  
start an Evening class to teach mechanic drawing  
to mechanics and Artizans both European and  
Native, His Honor gave me to understand  
that if a scheme was put before him in a  
tangible form he would be prepared to sanction  
it and to give a grant of money for the purpose.

There has been some difficulty and  
considerable delay in maturing the scheme,  
but now that a great difficulty viz<sup>t</sup> that of  
providing

providing a suitable room for the purpose, has been removed by the offer from the Head of Presidency College to place at the disposal of the class for the evenings, the room used by the Civil Engineer classes during the day. I am able to submit my proposals for the consideration of His Honor.

The proposals are:—

To begin by opening a class three times a week in the evening after all workshops are closed to teach free of charge, drawing to mechanics and Artizans both European and Native.—

That applicants should only be admitted to the Class on certificates of character either from their employes or other responsible parties.—

That the drawing to be taught shall be simple mechanical drawing of a Native to enable workmen to understand drawings given to them, and to make rough working drawings of articles they are called upon to make in the practice of their trade, that is the teaching will be confined to that which is necessary to make

working men efficient and it will in some trades include a small amount of mechanical instruction that will be necessary to ensure a proper understanding of the work.

If, as is possible, some of those attending the classes show ability to go beyond what is provided for, in the class: at first such men will have to resort to the Civil Engineering classes but it hereafter a sufficient number advance as to enable a higher practical class to be started a special class may be opened on a separate evening for the purpose.

The pay of the drawing master may  
at first seem large for so short attendance  
but this attendance will form only a small  
portion of his work the main part of which  
will be in the preparation of drawings for  
the men to copy. The following shews some  
what the work to be done.

1 Simple lines and geometrical figures.

2. Out-line drawings of small objects  
Full size to be copied with object  
before the learner.
3. Out lines drawing to scale of larger  
objects to be copied with object before  
the learner.
4. Rough plans of Buildings such, as  
Bricklayer would be called upon  
to understand.
5. Drawings of work such as carpenters  
and others of like trades would  
be called upon to use.
6. Drawings such as Turners & Fitters  
would be called upon to use.
7. Drawings to supply a knowledge  
of all ordinary scales.
8. Drawings of all kinds shewing  
how each description of work is  
in practice set out.

These drawings would necessarily  
have to be made from actual objects so that  
every



every object may be brought into class to enable  
the Learner to examine it with the drawing

From this it will be seen that the  
Teacher of drawing will have to devote a  
considerable time to the work.—

As soon as His Honor sanctions  
the scheme and the grant of money I propose  
to advertize the school in such vernacular  
papers as are likely to give publicity to it  
and I propose to send round a Circular to  
all Employees of labour inviting them to  
send their good men to the class.—

“ Notice is hereby given that the 17th February has been fixed for the next examination of candidates for the native civil service under the rules of the 9th of July. Examinations will be held at Hooghly, Dacca, Patna, Cuttack, and Gowhatty.

Preliminary examinations of candidates will be held, under rules 2 and 8, at the following places, namely Calcutta, Krishnaghur, Jessore, Burdwan, Hooghly, Midnapore, Berhampore, Dinagepore, Rajshahye, Rungpore, Julpigoree, Dacca, Burrisaul, Mymensing, Sylhet, Chittagong, Comillah, Patna, Gya, Arrah, Mozufferpore, Chuprah, Bhaugulpore, Purneah, Cuttack, Ranchee, Gowhatty, Durrung, Debrooghur, on some date between the 20th and 25th January, to be locally notified by the Magistrate of the district.

Applications for permission to appear at the above examinations must reach the Junior Secretary to the Government of Bengal before Saturday, the 6th January.”

Princeton College the 13 January 1873

The supply of Gas to the Laboratory of the Princeton College is and has long been insufficient and very irregular. Gas is required only in the day time for the chemical and other experimental work - in connection with the Laboratory and as the supply is delivered at a very low pressure at all times, and is withheld completely on an average, on one day out of three. The inconvenience incurred to the work of the Laboratory and Physical Science Lecture Room is very great indeed.

2 The only effectual remedy will be to provide the Laboratory with a small Gasometer which will be filled when the gas is supplied under full pressure during the night to remain available for day consumption, and I wish therefore to submit an application that such a Gasometer

may be sanctioned - A gas holder having  
a capacity of about 50 cubic feet will  
be sufficient for the purpose, and the cost  
exclusive of fencing &c will not exceed 335 Rs.  
Allowing 35 Rupees for ~~buying~~ fencing - The  
total cost will not exceed 370 Rupees.

3 Such a gasometer has been long  
in use at the Medical College Laboratory  
and is indeed indispensable wherever  
Chemical work is carried on. I should  
add that the Gasometer I propose  
can easily be removed to the new building  
when the Laboratory and Lecture rooms  
shall be transferred to it - and I  
recommend therefore that it be sanctioned  
for immediate use.

(RESOLUTION.)

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Calcutta, the December 1872.

READ again—

Letter No. 3280, dated the 31st October 1871, addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, drawing his attention to certain tabular statements submitted with his report on the Government and Mission schools in Meerbhoom, from which it was made apparent to the Lieutenant-Governor that in the adjustment of tuition charges, the lower classes of schools were made to pay for the higher, and remarking further as follows :—“The Lieutenant-Governor apprehends that this is too much the case in Bengal, so that not only do the higher institutions cost more than the lower, but a double injustice is done to lower education by making it pay for the higher classes in each school.” A careful report was called for from the Director.

Read again—

Letter from the Director of Public Instruction, No. 1606, dated 24th April 1872, in reply to the above, forwarding letter from Inspectors of Schools on the question of the relative rates of fees to be charged in the different classes of schools in Bengal, repeating his own opinion in favor of a uniform or nearly uniform fee of moderate amount throughout all classes, expressing himself strongly against the increase of charge in the higher classes of Government schools, and quoting, with approval, the observations in the same direction made by the Inspector of the South-East Division, Mr. C. B. Clarke.

Read again—

Letter No. 1824, dated the 6th June, calling upon the Director for fuller information as to the rates of fees realised in the several classes of schools in the Lower Provinces, laying down the principle that a distinction must be drawn between fees from boys learning Vernacular and those learning English, and enquiring whether there were any purely Vernacular classes in the schools classed as English.

Read—

Letter No. 3609, dated the 6th September 1872, from the Director of Public Instruction, forwarding four statements embodying the particulars required by Government, and stating that there are no purely Vernacular classes in any of the schools classed as English.

1. In regard to the remarks of the Director of Public Instruction and of Mr. Clarke as to the apprehended increase in the fee rates levied in the higher classes of Government colleges and schools, the Lieutenant-Governor would observe that the reference to the educational authorities was made with the view *not* of raising the fees paid by the higher classes, but of lowering those paid by the lower classes. His Honor has during the last two years on more than one occasion refused to sanction the enhancement of fees at Government schools and colleges; and has expressed his opinion that the fee rates, Rs. 4 or Rs. 3, at the chief Government schools are very high compared with the fees at English Grammar Schools or large Scotch Schools, when the relative value of money in Bengal and in Great Britain is considered.

2. His Honor thinks, however, that the reduction of fees should begin in the lower classes, so as to bring the zillah schools within reach of well-to-do artisans and petty shop-keepers.

3. A table has been prepared in this office showing the comparative rates of fees charged in Government and private institutions, and it is impossible to avoid noticing the heaviness of the average fee rates in Government schools as compared with aided and Mission schools for the five or six lower classes.

4. His Honor believes that most of the Government higher schools are now in a flourishing financial condition, and will have more or less of a surplus at the end of the financial year. The old plan of distributing such surplus as gratuities among the masters has been strictly prohibited, and must not be again adopted at any Government school. His Honor hopes that the committees of any Government higher schools who have a surplus at the end of the current year will devote it to the reduction of the fee rates for the lower classes of those schools, or else will spend it in establishing cheap branch schools with very much lower fee rates than at present obtain in the lower classes of most Government schools.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of the above resolution be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction for information and guidance; and also to all Commissioners and Magistrates for communication to school committees.

I AM directed to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. Edgar's letter No. 793G, dated 27th July 1872, submitting, for the approval of the Government of India, certain special rules which the Government of Bengal proposes to issue for the grant of leave of absence to deserving and capable public servants desirous of attending the special classes opened at the Presidency and at Hooghly, Dacca, Patna, and Cuttack, for the purpose of giving instruction in certain special branches of study which form the subjects of examination of candidates for civil appointments in Bengal.

The Government of India understand the case to be this.

The Hon'ble the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal has prescribed certain examinations which must be passed, in order to render any person eligible for certain higher subordinate appointments, such as deputy magistracies, &c.

Officers who are already employed in inferior appointments under Government, are allowed to present themselves at these examinations if they can get certificates from their superiors that they are deserving of such promotion and capable.

But there are technical difficulties as to such officers absenting themselves from their duties for the purpose of attending these examinations; the permission of the head of the office and of the Government of Bengal is not sufficient; the Account Department requires that such leave shall be granted in accordance with some specific leave rule sanctioned by the Government of India.

Under these circumstances it will perhaps meet the wishes of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor if the Government of India authorizes him to give leave to such an officer (irrespective of, and independently of all other leave rules) for the number of days which is actually necessary to enable him to attend the examination. The absence is expected to be short, and no deduction need be made from the candidates' allowances beyond what the head of the office finds necessary to enable him to make arrangements for carrying on the work. Up to that amount, however high, the candidate must suffer deductions, as the absence is entirely in his own interests. Such leave should not be allowed more than twice for each standard of examination.

SIR,

I AM directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 4700, dated the 17th December, and in reply to inform you that the Lieutenant-Governor is pleased to sanction for the present year, that is to the 31st May 1873, the proposals of the Principal of the Presidency College for the disposal of the funds available from three of the unallotted graduate scholarships belonging to the civil engineering department.

2. The scholarships, when awarded, should take effect from the 1st October instead of 1st January, the holders will thus be entitled to draw three months' arrears.

3. For the future, if graduate scholarships are not taken up in May next, the savings from the grant may very well be devoted to attracting F.A. men and good entrance men. But to this end the scholarship rates should be higher, Rs. 20 or 25 for the F.A. men and Rs. 15 or 12 per mensem for the entrance men. The engineering scholarships should not be lower than the arts scholarships awardable to the same grade of students.


